



How to Navigate and Complete a VES Class


When starting a VES Class, please proceed directly to the first tab, "Start Here". This section has important information and resources to help you complete your first VES Class.



All documents are downloaded in a PDF format to your download folder. Documents must be retrieved from this location. This location will vary according to the type of device and or browser that you are using.




Each VES Class was designed to be completed like reading a book, starting with the upper-left section on the page and going from the top component to the bottom component in that section before proceeding to the next section.




- > Not all sections or components need to be viewed or completed to proceed to the next component or section, or to complete a VES Class.




	Component	Description
Α	Presentation Video	Primary presentation video that must be completed to access the section's remaining components
В	Test	Pass the test to unlock bonus videos, Segment Incentive Bonus, Words of Wisdom, credits and Certificate of Completion
С	Bonus Videos	Select classes include additional educational bonus videos that are unlocked after passing the test
D	Words of Wisdom	Benefit that provides passing test participants with the instructor's single most important piece of investment advice







KEY TERMS & DEFINITIONS

Basic Stock Investing (Wayne A. Thorp)

This list contains investment terms and concepts covered in the presentation that you should be familiar with.

American depositary receipt (ADRs) — a security representing the ownership interest in a foreign company and that is traded on a U.S. stock exchange

Ask - the minimum price that a seller posts and that they are willing to sell shares at.

Bear market – occurs when prices are falling. A bear market is normally defined as a market that has fallen a minimum of 20% from recent highs.

Bid — the maximum price that a buyer posts and that they are willing to buy shares at.

Bull market – a sustained period when prices are rising. Some analysts define a bull market as a 20% rise in prices following a previous bear market.

Debt-to-equity ratio — a ratio that shows the total debt and liabilities of a company compared to the total shareholder's equity.

Discount broker — stock brokerage service that charges reduced commissions and fees and provides little or no investment advice.

 $\label{eq:Dollar-cost} \textbf{Dollar-cost averaging (DCA)} - \text{an investment strategy where smaller periodic purchases are made over time.}$

Dow Jones industrial average — also known as the Dow; a price-weighted index of 30 large U.S. corporations.

Full-service broker – stock brokerage service that may charge higher commissions or fees but may provide investment advice along with various other services & products.

Fractional share - a portion of a share that is less than one complete or whole share.

Hedging – a technique that involves taking positions to offset or reduce risk on an investment and/or portfolio.

Initial public offering (IPO) — the process of offering shares of a private corporation to the public as a new stock issuance.

Insider — a company officer, manager, director or other person who has access to nonpublic information about a company.

Maintenance margin — the minimum equity required in a margin account (which uses borrowed money) that must be maintained to keep an account's current positions open.

Over the counter (OTC) — a method of transacting securities on a broker-dealer network (as opposed to a formal stock exchange).

Listed stock - stock that trades on formal exchanges.

Risk – the chance that an outcome or an investment's actual returns will differ from the anticipated or expected outcome or return.

Risk-free investment - believed to have or carry a certain return with no variability or risk.

Risk-free rate of return — the theoretical rate of return of an investment with zero risk.

Return on investment (ROI) — a ratio of the total return of an investment divided by the total cost for the investment.

Reverse stock split - the division of a company's existing stock into fewer shares.

Shareholder's equity — the net worth of a business; shows how much the owners of a company have invested in the business, either by investing in it or by retaining earnings over time.

Share class — different types of shares that a company creates that contain different aspects for shareholders, such as voting rights.

Share - a single unit of ownership that investors can buy or sell.

Short selling — an investment strategy that takes a position to profit or protect (hedge) on the decline in prices of an investment.

Special dividend — a nonrecurring distribution of a company's assets, usually in the form of cash to shareholders.

Special purpose acquisition company (SPAC) – a company that is formed strictly to raise capital through an initial public offering (IPO) for the purpose of acquiring an existing private company.

Speculation — the taking of a position in order to profit from a directional move in market prices of an investment.

Standard deviation — mathematical measure of historical volatility expressed as the degree to which returns of an asset have varied arounds its mean.

S&P 500 index - a market-capitalization-weighted index of 500 large U.S. corporations.
